## What have I learned (Part 3 of 3)

N my previous articles about my study leave I have explained the new role of vicars who look after more than one church. This involves a move from the traditional task of a vicar towards team working and oversight.

We had an open meeting for church members from all three churches on Wed 19th September when I explained my research and invited those attending to discuss the way forward. A week later, on 26th September, members from all PCCs joined together for a meeting to make decisions based on those discussions. The debate was encouraging because of the good will and constructive attitudes of all concerned. You will find the statement from that meeting elsewhere in this magazine.

The decision for the laity to participate more in worship, to share more "special services" and to have a monthly joint service of Holy Communion will enable people to use their gifts, get to know each other better and will also free me to offer worship that reaches out into the community (e.g. memorial services etc).

The meeting also decided to share the responsibility for pastoral care and other ministries. We hope to create teams that can do this (we already have a children's workers team with people from Brookfield and Stainton who offer occasional family workshops).

Recognising that people will need training to take on these ministries I was asked to invite Rev Angela Bailey, the Cleveland Training Adviser, to come and explain what she is able to offer us. That meeting is scheduled for 8th January and will be a joint PCC meeting that will be open to anyone who is interested.

I realise that these changes are happening at a time of much adjustment for St Margaret's congregation but they are important for the sustainability of all three churches in the plurality.

## The Slough Of Despond – from Pilgrims Progress

N the reign of James 2nd the popular protestant preacher John Bunyan (1628-1688) was arrested and thrown into prison for 'holding unlawful assemblies and not conforming to the national worship of the Church of England. Because he refused to conform he was thrown into Bedford Jail in 1660 and he remained there for 12 years. Pilgrim's Progress was written in prison in the hope of strengthening the faith of his congregation. It is now known as the world's most famous allegory which tells of the Christian journey of faith, it's joys and dangers, hopes and disappointments, progress and set–backs and eventually it's great rewards . John Bunyan writes as if retelling a dream

Christian set out on his journey of faith. His friends and neighbours, even his wife and family, thought he was a fool. Only Pliable stayed with him and as they walked Christian explained to him what the Lord had promised about the Kingdom of heaven. Along the road, in the middle of the plain, was a very miry bog. The Slough of Despond,. Busily talking Christian and Pliable both fell into the bog and they were soon stuck in the mud. Christian began to sink. Pliable managed to struggle out but he gave up the journey and made for home, leaving Christian sinking deeper in despair to struggle alone... Until a man called Help came and pulled him back onto the right track. 'Why did you stumble into the mire' he asked 'Did you not use the stepping stones to safety'?

Why do I tell you this story? Well I feel that our parishes are in danger of falling into our own Slough of Despond and there may not be a 'Help' around to drag us back onto the right track.

Will this generation be the one to close our churches? We are certainly suffering from a shortage of volunteers.

As Christians we are called to rejoice in the Lord, to give sacrificially of our time and money, to spread Good News, to love one another, to be a welcoming community, attractive to others. But what do people see at present? I will leave the words to you.

Fortunately there are stepping stones. We must reach out; welcome in; abandon negativity and apathy and the words 'can't do' need to be removed from our thinking. We are the church; God has no hands but ours.

## Red Cross Auziliary Hospitals in the North Riding of Yorkshire:

#### Stainton Mothers' Union travels back in time

URING the period of national and international commemoration of the First World War, you will probably have come across the acronym 'V.A.D.', which stands for 'Voluntary Aid Detachment(s)'. The Voluntary Aid Detachments were set up by the British Red Cross from 1909 onwards, in response to a request from the War Office, in order to 'provide for supplementary aid to the Territorial Medical Service, to meet the needs of War'. But perhaps, like me, you thought that 'V.A.D.s' were people, not units? Women, mostly, in long blue uniform dresses, a Red Cross prominent on their aprons and a headdress that made them look like a nun? (Just cast your mind back to Testament of Youth, The Crimson Field, Downton Abbey, and other 1914-1918 dramas or novels). Well, thanks to a fascinating talk by two local ladies who shared their extensive knowledge with us at our Stainton Mothers' Union Branch meeting in October, I can tell you that:-

■ These ladies of the First World War, dressed as described and usually with the financial means to support themselves, were trained by the Red Cross to work as nurses both at home and abroad. They nursed troops who would refer to them as 'Very Adorable Darlings'!

There were Men's Detachments, too, consisting of men unfit or too old to fight.


■ V.A.D.s worked alongside doctors and registered nurses to staff temporary hospitals, not only in fighting zones, but throughout England and Wales.

■ In the North Riding, V.A.D.s and others worked in 32 Red Cross Auxiliary Hospitals, providing 1,454 beds and caring for 18,442 sick and injured men between 1914 and 1920. The President of the North Riding Red Cross Association was Lady Florence Bell, of East Rounton.

Eileen Brereton and Anne Wall, Red Cross members and former nurses, spoke with humour and enthusiasm about their researches into the North Riding Hospitals, and told moving stories of the work done by individual volunteers. We were privileged to see and handle many artefacts of the period, including medical instruments, medals, photographs, documents, and knitted garments faithfully recreated from authentic patterns. They had

tracked down for us the record of a local volunteer, Lady Adeline Fawcett of Stainton Grange, who had worked at (probably) the Auxiliary Hospital at Stokesley Manor. Eileen and Anne have published a book about the role of the Auxiliary Hospitals in the North Riding, Home Comforts, which contains many photographs of the period. A number of us bought copies, so if you would like to borrow one, just ask!

It was a truly inspiring evening: an opportunity for Stainton MU to contribute to Eileen and Anne's chosen charity, the Nursing Memorial Appeal, and to reflect (as they write in the Introduction to their book) on 'the need for such service to continue long into the future, whatever that may hold'.

## **THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH**



NNELIES Marie Frank (12 June 1929 —February or March 1945) was a German-born diarist. One of the most discussed Jewish victims of the Holocaust, she gained fame posthumously following the publication of The Diary of a Young Girl,(The Secret Annex), in which she documents her life in hiding from 1942 to 1944, during the German occupation of the Netherlands in World War II. It is one of the world's most widely known books and has been the basis for several plays and films.

Born in Frankfurt, Germany, she lived most of her life in or near Amsterdam, Netherlands, having moved there with her family at the age of four-and-a-half when the Nazis gained control over Germany. Born a German national, Frank lost her citizenship in 1941 and thus became stateless. By May 1940, the Franks were trapped in Amsterdam by the German occupation of the Netherlands. As persecutions of the Jewish population increased in July 1942, the family went into hiding in some concealed rooms behind a bookcase in the building where Anne's father worked. From then until the family's arrest by the Gestapo in August 1944, Anne kept a diary she had received as a birthday present, and wrote in it regularly. Following their arrest, the Franks were transported to concentration camps. In October or November 1944, Anne and her sister, Margot, were transferred to camp from Auschwitz, where they died (probably of typhus) a few months later. They were originally estimated by the Red Cross to have died in March, with Dutch authorities setting 31 March as their official date of death, but research by the Anne Frank House in 2015 suggests they more likely died in February.

Frank's father, Otto, the only survivor of the family, returned to Amsterdam after the war to find that her diary had been saved by one of the helpers, Miep Gies, and his efforts led to its publication in 1947. It was translated from its original Dutch version and first published in English in 1952 as The Diary of a Young Girl, and has since been translated into over 60 languages.

Anne Frank's diary endures, not only

because of the remarkable events she described, but due to her extraordinary gifts as a storyteller and her indefatigable spirit through even the most horrific of circumstances. "It's utterly impossible for me to build my life on a foundation of chaos, suffering and death," she wrote on July 15, 1944. "I see the world being slowly transformed into a wilderness; I hear the approaching thunder that, one day, will destroy us too. I feel the suffering of millions. And yet, when I look up at the sky, I somehow feel that everything will change for the .more."

When she was imprisoned in the Nazi death camp, those with her said "her tears(for them) never ran dry," making her a blessed presence for all who knew her. Because of this, scholar Kenneth Bailey concluded that Ann never displayed "compassion fatigue."

Compassion fatigue can be one of the results of loving in a badly broken world. The sheer volume of human suffering can't numb

even the best intentioned among us. Compassion fatigue however, was not in Jesus makeup, Matthew 9;35 – 36 says, "Jesus went through all the towns and villages teaching in the synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the Kingdom of God and healing every disease and sickness. When he saw the crowds he had compassion on them because they were harassed and helpless like sheep without a shepherd.

Our world suffers not only from physical needs but also from spiritual brokenness. Jesus came to meet that need and challenged his followers to join him in his work. He prayed that the father would raise up workers to respond to the needs all around us – people who struggle with loneliness, sin and illness. May we in the strength of his spirit express our complete concern to those who are suffering.

## A Eulogy for David Henry Clark

written by his brother John

AVID Henry Clark was born to Harry and Dorothy Clark on 21st April 1951 in Haltwhistle, Northumberland. They shared their home with Harry's mother, David's grandma, who helped to teach David to read before he was school age. They attended the Methodist Church where Harry was organist and steward and Dorothy was a Sunday school teacher.

In 1956 David was joined in the family by John, who did his best to irritate his placid older brother and, more often than not, he failed.

David passed his 11-plus, and in 1962 went to Queen Elizabeth Grammar School in Hexham. Anthony Wood, our organist today, was his form prefect in his first year.

David's 17th birthday fell on the day, when Tyne Tees Television broadcast a service from the Methodist Church in Haltwhistle, with Harry at the organ, so the ever-patient David had to wait for his first drive on the public roads.

He was also part of a church youth group, whose number included a certain Kathleen Reed.

David began work in the Midland Bank in Hexham in 1969. He was later moved to Guisborough, where he initially stayed in digs Monday to Friday and travelled home at the weekends. At the same time, Kathleen was teaching in the west end of Newcastle, staying with a relative in the week and Haltwhistle at weekends. It soon became the pattern that David would take Kathleen to Newcastle early on Monday mornings on his way to Teesside. These times spent together soon blossomed into deeper feelings and they married on 2nd August 1975.

They set up home in Acklam, David working in a few different branches in the area; Kathleen teaching at Archibald school, saying she would "give Middlesbrough five years". Like many young couples, they hoped to start a family. However the longed-for child, Tamar Mary, who was born on 26th January 1978 only survived for a short time.

After a while Kathleen resumed her career at Newport School, where David supported her through Ofsted reports and spells in leadership roles.

David continued to work at HSBC, until being made redundant in 1996. He took a few training courses with a view to taking a job in the public sector, and eventually found employment at James Cook Hospital. David and Kathleen were always frequent visitors to Haltwhistle.

Kathleen's father, John, died in 1980; and mother, Mary, suffered periods of serious illness, as did David's parents; brother, John, retired on health grounds in 1997 and returned home to Haltwhistle. David's parents died, just weeks apart in 1999.

David and Kathleen worshipped at Trinity Methodist Church for several years, and were heavily involved but when they were going to Haltwhistle after church on Sundays they attended the 8 o'clock service at St Margaret's to give them an earlier start, and after a while became members here. David later became treasurer "temporarily" while someone was poorly and eventually also churchwarden.

David held a deep faith, maintained through many trials and tribulations during his 67 years.

He began training as a Methodist local preacher in the 60s, but found he could better serve his church and his Lord in background roles.

Kathleen retired early from teaching in 2005, and David left his hospital job during a reorganisation. Around this time Mary had a prolonged stay in hospital. Kathleen herself became ill and after months in hospital, the love of David's life, died on Christmas Day 2007.

David continued his attentive care for, mother-in-law, Mary until her death – he could not have done more for her. He also made a phone call every day to Brother John.

David looked forward to his Thursday with retired bank staff each month, and continued to go for a meal at half-term with Kathleen's school colleagues. He sent birthday cards to many friends and acquaintances as well as family and always took cream cakes with him for the girls when he went to

the hairdressers. Middlesbrough's "five years" became forty-three for David.

He was a good friend to many, and we will all miss his cheery countenance.

I would like to thank all at St Margaret's for their hospitality to our friends and family on the occasion of my brother's funeral. I would offer special thanks to Vivienne, for her commitment to visiting David while he was in hospital and her personal support for me through a difficult time. Blessings to you all.
