The Magi



IN many churches there are windows depicting the presentation of gifts by the 3 wise men, kings, or Magi, depending on your view. The visit of the Magi is commemorated by the observance of Epiphany on the 6th January.

But who are these people who have given us such a magnificent example of faith, just imagine what it would take for you to pack

up and follow your belief. Think of how long they must have been travelling. Just looking at the map we can see that the distance between from Babylon to Bethlehem is about 600 miles. Such a distance by camel must have taken many months, and that's without any preparation, and pondering on the reason for the star appearing.

Matthew (2:1-12) is the only writer that tells us of the visit of the Magi, although he doesn't tell how many they were, we assume the number three from the gifts. The Magi are popularly referred to as wise men and kings. As part of their religion, these priests paid particular attention to the stars, and gained an international reputation for astrology, which was at that time highly regarded as a science. Their religious practices and use of astrology caused derivatives of the term Magi to be applied to the occult in general and led to the English term magic. The King James Version of the Bible names them as wise men. Their identification as kings is often linked to the Old Testament prophecies such as that in Isaiah 60:3, which describe the Messiah being worshipped by kings.

Traditions identify a variety of different names for the Magi. We commonly know them as Melchior, Caspar, and Balthasar, from the carol. These names are apparently derived from a Greek manuscript probably composed in Alexandria around 500 A.D.,

But what of those strange gifts also so explicitly identified in Matthew: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. As you may expect there are many different theories of the meaning and symbolism of these gifts. Probably gold is the easiest to

accept and explain, frankincense, and particularly myrrh, are much more obscure.

Though Bible historians over the years have presented many theories they appear to fall into two groups: The first is that all three of the gifts are ordinary offerings and gifts given to a king. Myrrh being commonly used as anointing oil, frankincense as a perfume, and gold as a valuable. However alternative theories give the three gifts a more spiritual meaning: gold is stated as a symbol of kingship on earth, frankincense (which is incense) as a symbol of priestship, and myrrh embalming oil) as a symbol of death. An alternative eluded to in the carol "We Three Kings" in which the magi describe their gifts, is that gold symbolises virtue, frankincense symbolises prayer, and myrrh symbolises suffering.

Mathew tells us that they came from the East, traditionally the view is that they were Babylonian or Persians or Jews from Yemen, The majority belief was they were from Babylon, which was the centre of Zurvanism, and hence astrology, at the time.

Mathew tells us that they found Jesus by following his star, the Star of Bethlehem. As you may expect there are a number of theories as to the nature of this star. Johannes Kepler (imperial astronomer for Rudolph II of Germany), appears to be the first to speculate, just before Christmas 1603 he observed a pairing of Jupiter with Saturn from his observatory in Prague, and speculated that this or a supernova could have happened at the time of Jesus' birth. Mark Kidger an astronomer at Spain's Instituto de Astrofisica de Canarias, in the Canary Islands agrees and put forward a scenario some years ago that the Star, which the Magi first saw in the east at dawn, would have risen an hour earlier every two weeks until it was almost exactly due south at dawn. So when the Magi set out for Bethlehem, travelling south from Jerusalem, they would have once again seen the Star before them, appearing like it "hovered" right above Jesus' birthplace, and by the time the Magi reached there the nova might have started to fade.

We can only marvel at the Magi's faith and at the sight that they travelled so far to see. May we see that faith this Christmas.

“Home Comforts”

A follow up to last month’s article which Julia Ardley wrote about Red Cross Hospitals

This is the title of a book written by Eileen Brereton and Anne Wall who have been and still are researching details of the local Red Cross Auxiliary Hospitals in the North Riding of Yorkshire during the 1914 - 18 war.

We had the pleasure of them speaking to Stainton Mothers’ Union in October together with many interesting articles from the First World War They had a great selection of 1st World War medals...I spotted one which is similar to my paternal great aunt’s thanking her for her Volunteer Aid Detachment (VAD) work during the war.

Miss Ethel Oliver lived in Grange Road and would serve at Holgate Hospital, Middlesbrough - at the time of writing cannot find her name listed but a lot of records were lost or not written up.

Looking on the site www.northridingvadhospitals.co.uk this makes fascinating reading following Northern Echo and various links.

I proudly wore this medal at the Remembrance Services in the Memorial Hall on the Saturday and Stainton Church on the Sunday. I am going to donate these items to Eileen and Anne to add to their display as it is in it’s original box together with a letter from London from the Army Council. “The success of the Red Cross Society and the order of St John has been due to the faithful work of their members.” Also a letter from Lady Bell (Gertrude Bell’s mother) President of the North Riding of Yorkshire Branch of Red Cross and Order of St John of Jerusalem

It was mentioned that I was going to Wydale with Mothers’ Union and was asked to find out what information they had as Wydale had also been a hospital. I took photos out of the Home Comforts book of the Wydale book and some photos taken there. There were also details when it opened in December 1914 and closed in June 1915 having 15 beds and treated 60 patients. The Commandant was Mrs Illingworth who was the owner of the house.

There was no sign of this book at Wydale possibly the owner kept it! My photos and information were received well. I took another photo and text hanging in the library for Eileen and Anne, that was all they had at Wydale!

The Real Story of Christmas

2. The response to those who heard the story:

"All who heard it were amazed." The grace of God is amazing: God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them, and he has committed to us the message of reconciliation.

The gospel is not good advice its good news. Your sin debt is cancelled, your books are reconciled, and now you can have a personal relationship with God by putting your trust in Christ. It doesn't get any better.



3. Mary's part in the story.

The angel replied "the holy spirit will come upon you."

Mary treasured all these things and pondered them in her heart.

She wanted to understand what God was doing and how it related to her, and we need to do that too.

God had a unique plan for Mary, and he has one for us too. We are privileged to see into the future and we don't know what God has in store for us, but he has a plan. After the



angel spoke to Mary, notice what she said! “be it unto me according to thy word” Not according to your social status, or your job description or your finances, or what you deserve. No “be it unto me according to thy word” was that easy to say or believe no, she was taking an extreme risk. To be pregnant and unmarried brought dire consequences in those days. Yet she gave



herself willingly to God and the results were miraculous and God can do the same for us.

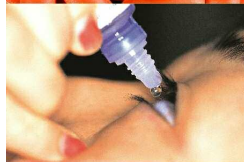
