To all my friends

Some of you will already know, I have asked the Bishop to allow me to reduce my hours to a half time post. The PCCs of Stainton and Hilton have voted unanimously that they wish me to remain as their parish priest and that is the current plan.

I appreciate that this will be a time of uncertainty for everyone concerned and I will do my best to support you. However, I urge you all to pray for the process and each other during this difficult time.

Your children need your time

Can you imagine how these children felt when Jesus rebuked his own disciples for pushing them away, and said, "Come unto me"? How many destinies were changed that day because he loved these little ones and took time for them?

He gave them something every child needs and deserves – self worth and the dignity of their own thoughts and opinions.

When you listen to me, it means that what I say matters, and more importantly, I matter to you. After years spent hearing words like, "don't bother me...shut up...I don't have time", something important in a child begins to die – creativity and confidence. Can you imagine facing life without those qualities? You say "but I am so busy." That may be so, but you're certainly not busier than Jesus, and he made time for children. Parents are you listening? The pressure is on! because today many children commit adult crimes. Generally speaking when we study them we find that because they never learned to express their emotions in constructive ways, they end up behaving destructively. As a child he took a hammer and smashed his toy to pieces; now as a man he drives his fist through walls. His shirt size has changed, but the messages inside his head are still the same – nobody listens, nobody understands, nobody cares. This is serious business, and if you think too much is being made out of too little think again

If your children want your attention, give them it. Do it right and you will have wonderful memories, do it wrong and you will live with regrets.

Remember, the greatest gift you can give a child is your time.

Hymn Stories (2 of 3)

John Newton (1725 - 1807)

Amazing Grace, how sweet the sound, That saved a wretch like me. I once was lost but now am found, Was blind, but now I see.

OHN Newton crammed a lot of living into his 82 years. His mother died when he was six years old, and he joined his father at sea when he was eleven. He served his apprenticeship as a sailor, and rose through the ranks until he became the captain of a slave ship. He abandoned the religious training that he had experienced as a child, and revelled in the dissolute life of a slave trader. He was noted for his profanity and his cruelty, and was even known as 'The Great Blasphemer'.

But one stormy night off the coast of Donegal, when his ship had been holed and was in danger of sinking, and he was in danger of drowning, Newton had a real change of heart. Newton called out to God as the ship filled with water. After he called out, the cargo flowed out and stopped up the hole, and the ship was able to drift to safety. It might have been his religious training at his mother's knee surfacing after all those years — or it might have been his love for Mary Catlett, a Christian woman whom he later married — or it might have been his reading of the book, Imitation of Christ, by William Law — or it might have been all three. In any event, Newton had a real conversion experience. However, as he was to admit later, "I cannot consider myself to have been a believer, in the full sense of the word."

For a while, Newton continued on his slave ship, but he began to treat both the slaves and his crew with a good deal more compassion. Finally, convinced that the slave trade was wrong, he left his ship and took a job onshore.

He then felt a call to the ministry, and was ordained at age forty and assigned to a church at Olney, Buckinghamshire. Newton wrote many hymns, including How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds and Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken, but he is best remembered for Amazing Grace, which is in a sense Newton's own story. It was amazing grace that saved him, and it was amazing grace that was the focus of his preaching.

He continued in ministry through the rest of his long life, even after failing eyesight made it impossible for him to read. Newton never ceased to be amazed by God's grace and, nearing the end of his life, told his friends, "My memory is nearly gone; but I remember two things: That I am a great sinner, and that Christ is a great Saviour."

Also if you would like to help in any way please feel free to come along and chat to Judith, Bob, Joan and Vernon.


Norman Frankish R.I.P

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

At the Cross – A final thought



Standing by the cross of Jesus were his mother, Mary the wife of Clopas and Mary Magdaline.

"Standing by the cross of Jesus...." John puts the scene into focus. We do not see many of Jesus followers here. It was just to dangerous to be identified with a condemned criminal. Such recklessness could land you on the next cross.

But these women were there...

Mary the mother of Jesus

That moment that Jesus hung on the cross became the agonising fulfilment of words that had been spoken to Mary three decades earlier. After the birth of Jesus, when she and Joseph had brought the child to the temple an aged man, Simeon stepped into the temple and declared the arrival of the Messiah. His words of joy were muted however, by the words of he spoke to Mary...

Behold, this child is appointed for the fall and rise of many In Israel, and for a sign to be opposed – and a sword will pierce even your own soul – to the end that thoughts from many hearts may be revealed.

Tucked away in those words of victory and joy was that phrase filled with pain: "and a sword will pierce even your own soul". Now the agony of watching her son die becomes that sword of grief and suffering that Mary had feared for so many years.

Salome, the rebuked (Mary's sister)

She is the mother of James and John. (Cousins of Jesus) The interesting thing about her presence at the cross was that she had received a stern rebuke from Jesus when she had sought the chief places in the kingdom for her sons.

Though she had been rebuked, her presence at the cross shows that she had the humility to accept the rebuke and to love with undiminished devotion. It also shows that Jesus was able to rebuke in such a way that his love was still evident.

Mary the wife of Clopas

She was the wife of Clopas and mother of James and Joses.

This Mary was no doubt a believer in Christ and came and stood by his cross; not merely to keep her sister company, but out of affection to Jesus, and to testify her faith in him.

Mary Magdalene

Mary had been demon possessed and Jesus rescued her. Of all the characters delivered from demons by Christ in the gospels, none showed such consistent devotion to the saviour as this Mary.

These women and others, at no amount of personal risk, continued to identify

themselves with the master, even as he died for them. They showed strength of courage simply by being there.

The origins behind the 40 days of Lent, the significance of Palm Sunday and other days in the Christian calendar



Lent is the period of 40 days before Easter in the Christian calendar; it is a time of reflection for many Christians as they prepare to remember and celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

What is Lent? For some, Lent is a 40 day period of giving up chocolate, caffeine, sugar or

something else after Pancake Day. Traditionally, it's seen as a time in which to reflect upon the life and death of Jesus. However much we already know about Lent, the story of Lent is one which reminds us of why it is marked by so many around the world.

The arrival of Lent is characterised by pancakes! Shrove Tuesday, a day highly anticipated by all pancake lovers, is traditionally a day of preparation before the season of Lent begins. The 40 days of Lent represent the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness at the start of his ministry. Jesus fasted during his time in the wilderness, and so Christians identify with his suffering by abstaining from particular foods during this time, including meat, fish, milk and egg products.

Shrove Tuesday gets its name from the ritual of 'shriving'. This 1,000 year old practice involves a person confessing their mistakes, and receiving absolution for them before Lent begins.

Starting Lent: Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, a day of penitence or cleansing of the soul. Many Christians will attend Lent services, and be marked with a cross of ashes on their forehead. This is a sign of mortality, based upon the idea from the book of Genesis that humankind came into the world from dust and will return to it. It is a time to express sorrow over sin, and a reminder that Jesus brings freedom from sin. The following 40 days are an opportunity to remember Jesus' death.

Mothering Sunday occurs on the fourth Sunday of Lent, which many use as an opportunity to celebrate mothers, but also all who care for us. Mothering Sunday is thought to originate from when individuals returned to their mother church, typically a main church or cathedral of the area. It further developed when servants were allowed Mothering Sunday off to return home to their mother church and would often take a rare opportunity to see family.

Holy Week: Lent culminates in Holy Week. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, a day which commemorates Jesus' triumphant procession into Jerusalem on a donkey. In many churches the congregation are given palm crosses, whilst others wave palm branches. Occasionally a donkey is paraded near (or even in!) a church.

The Thursday before Easter is Holy Thursday, or Maundy Thursday. It is a reminder of the last meal Jesus ate with his disciples, washing their feet and leading them in the first

ever Eucharist. He foretold his death; drawing a direct parallel between the bread and his body, and the wine and his blood. The following day is Good Friday, a day commemorating Jesus' death on the cross. It is a day of mourning, when we remember the suffering and pain of Christ. The service on this day provides an opportunity for solemn reflection.

Easter Sunday: The calculation of the end of Lent has varied considerably in Christian history, with different Church traditions taking different approaches. If you count 40 days after Shrove Tuesday then Palm Sunday would be the 40th day. It is now usual in the West to count the last day of Lent as Easter Saturday, since the first Christians tended not to fast on Sundays as they should be a day of celebration of Jesus' resurrection. Thus making Easter Saturday the 40th day.

On Easter Sunday, the Church celebrates Jesus' resurrection. Fasts are finished, chocolate Easter eggs consumed, and the resurrection foreshadows the renewal of creation. Good Friday is so called because the death of Christ, as terrible as it was, led to the resurrection, which brought new life to those who believe. Good Friday challenges mere human goodness – it is the nature of Jesus' sacrifice that overcomes the weakness of humanity. Some Churches will light a paschal candle to represent the eternal presence of Jesus, as he rises from the dead.

The story of Lent is one of sadness and joy; a story which is still celebrated in diverse ways throughout the world today.

The charity's roots go back to 1991 and it's been a long hard struggle to the present day. In the 2017/18 financial year, it cost £5.17m to operate the service.
