To all my friends

As June starts we shall be in the “Thy Kingdom Come” season – the period between Ascension Day (30th May) and Pentecost (9th June) which has become a time of prayer for the growth of the Church. What started in 2016 as an invitation from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York to the Church of England has grown into an international and ecumenical call to prayer.

The “Thy Kingdom Come” website says:

During the 11 days of Thy Kingdom Come, it is hoped that everyone who takes part will:

- Deepen their relationship with Jesus Christ
- Pray for God’s spirit to work in the lives of those they know
- Come to realise that every aspect of their life is the stuff of prayer

After the very first Ascension Day the disciples gathered with Mary, constantly devoting themselves to prayer while they waited for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Like them, our reliance on the gift of the Holy Spirit is total – on our own we can do nothing.

Through the centuries Christians have gathered at that time to pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit. ‘Thy Kingdom Come’ picks up this tradition. Over the past three years more and more worshipping communities have dedicated the days between Ascension and Pentecost to pray ‘Come Holy Spirit’.

My first visit to St Margaret's Church was in 1962

It was all very new and a great deal of housing development was still happening all around. My friend and her fiancé had ordered a bungalow in Draycott Ave and they hoped to book their wedding at the new church but St Margaret's was not yet licensed to conduct weddings. They were told that they would qualify to be married in the ancient parish church in Stainton Village. They would need to make an appointment with the Vicar, Father Barker. I went with my friend to take a look at the old church and hopefully to arrange a date.

This was in the days before the A174 divided our communities and Hemlington was half a dozen houses, a pub and a hospital about 2 miles away and Stainton was still a small village surrounded by farms.

So we set off to walk the mile or so along the country lanes that led directly from Brookfield to Stainton leaving behind a church building at Brookfield that still smelled very new but felt a bit colourless and empty. It takes time for any building to develop its own character and St Margaret's had not yet had time to gather the trimmings that churches seem to attract.

We arrived at a church that had had plenty of time but was a bit like 'a place that time forgot'. Stainton church was cluttered and cobwebby with old decaying flags hanging like limp rags from the walls; it all looked tired and a bit forlorn, but it had its wonderful coloured glass and masses of atmosphere. My friend and her husband were married at Stainton and lived for many years in Brookfield.

Colin and I moved to the new development in Stainton in 1967. My mother could not understand why we wanted to move so far out into the countryside! Stainton and Brookfield was still one parish and there was a new younger Vicar and his family. The people hereabouts were having difficulty settling with his new ways. The PCC minutes record the arguments. We were told very forcefully that they were having 'no truck with the new ways you young 'ens seem to go for.' But that story is maybe for another day.

THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

ON Feb. 18, 1952, four men risked their lives in a howling nor'easter off Cape Cod to save 32 mariners on the shipwrecked tanker *Pendleton*. They brought all but one to safety in a wooden motorboat designed to hold no more than 16 people.

They were four Coast Guardsmen at the Chatham Lifeboat Station who volunteered to try to make what seemed to be an impossible rescue. They faced freezing temperatures and 60-foot waves in the hopes of reaching the *Pendleton*, an oil tanker that had snapped in two during the **fierce storm**. All received the Gold Lifesaving Medal, the **Coast Guard's** highest honour, for "extreme and heroic daring."

The Coast Guard called it the greatest rescue by a small boat in its history. The four men were called heroes. They shrugged it off and said they were just doing their job.

At 5 a.m. on Feb. 18, 1952, the *Pendleton* was headed south in blinding snow and violent seas 10 miles off the coast of **Chatham, Mass.** Suddenly the crewmen heard explosive cracking noises. The vessel lurched heavily and then broke in two.

The *Pendleton's* bow section lost power and drifted south with the captain and seven crewmen aboard. The power remained on



the stern section, and the chief engineer took charge and assigned duties to the 32 crewmen.

They didn't manage to issue an SOS.

At midmorning the Chatham Lifeboat Station got word that another tanker, the *Fort Mercer*, had also snapped in half. Cutters, an airplane and a lifesaving motorboat raced to rescue the vessel 20 miles off the coast.

Hours later, radar at the Coast Guard station showed the two broken pieces of the *Pendleton*.

Coxswain Bernard Webber was told to pick his crew and rescue the shipwrecked sailors. Three men volunteered for the suicidal mission: Coast Guardsmen Ervin Maske, Andrew Fitzgerald and Richard P. Livesey

They launched the 36-foot boat named the *CG-36500* into mountainous waves, blinding snow and zero visibility. To ward off fear, they sang *Rock of Ages* and *Harbour Lights*

as they approached Chatham's treacherous sand bar.

The *Pendleton* wreck lay just on the other side of the bar.

As they crossed the bar, a wave smashed into the *CG-36500* and threw it high into the air. The boat landed on its side and righted quickly before another wave struck it. The breaker shattered the windshield, flattened Coxswain Webber and sent shards of glass into his face. It also destroyed the compass, their only navigational aid.

After 20 survivors made it into the *CG-36500*, the little motorboat began to handle sluggishly. Webber believed they couldn't possibly make a return trip. But he decided they would all live or die together.



Their courageous feat was deemed one of the greatest rescues in the United States coastguard history and was the subject of the 2016 film *The finest hours*.

In Luke Jesus declared his own rescue mission: "The son of man came to seek and save the lost." The cross and the resurrection became the ultimate expression of rescue, as Jesus took on himself and restored to the

father all who trust and believe in him.

For 2,000 years people have embraced his offer of abundant life now and eternal life with him *rescued!*

As followers of Jesus we have the privilege with the holy spirits help, to join our saviour in the greatest rescue mission of all. Who in your life needs his rescuing love.

Please and Thank You

Please and Thank you Are basic manners (such as saying, “Please and “Thank you”) old-fashioned and a thing of the past? Why is it that adults have a hard time expressing appreciation for things they have been given?

Here are some interesting thoughts:-

“Of all the things a parent can teach a child, manners rates very close to the top of the “must teach” list.

Number one, when a child is taught, from the time he or she can talk to say “thank you” you are teaching that child thankfulness.

Number two, the insertion of the word “please” in a request changes the child from a demanding person to one who accepts the fact that when they ask a favour or make a request, the parent has no automatic obligation to respond favourably to that request. Response to “please” is much better than the “get this for me” demand type of approach. The child must be taught the idea that they must first serve before they can earn the right to command.”

Being kind, courteous, and grateful will never go out of style or become old-fashioned.

Let us strive to be gracious, respectful, and considerate of all with whom we come in contact. And may we always count our blessings-being grateful to our heavenly Father for His love and mercy.

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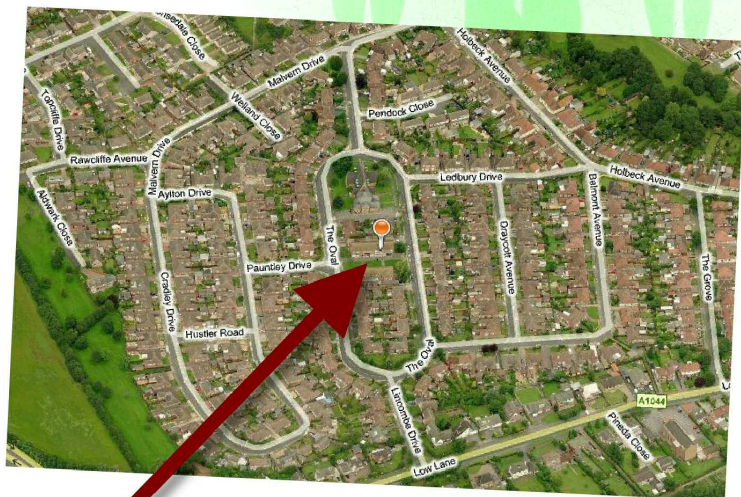
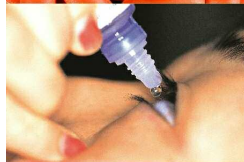


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
